


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# Road Map for American Indian and Alaska Native Peoples



The new *Healthy Brain Initiative: Road Map for American Indian and Alaska Native Peoples* provides actionable steps for strengthening public health responses to Alzheimer's and other dementias in American Indian and Alaska Native communities. Building on the success of the first edition released in 2019, this updated Road Map:

- Includes examples of public health actions from AI/AN communities.
